

HISTORY MADE AGAIN! FEDERAL FINANCIAL AID PROGRAM REINSTATED AT MORRIS BROWN COLLEGE AFTER NEARLY TWENTY YEARS

ATLANTA, GA (December 10, 2021) -- Morris Brown College (MBC) is proud to announce its reinstatement to participate in the Federal Financial Aid program administered by the United States Department of Education. This announcement comes on the heels of receiving accreditation candidacy by the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS), a Virginia-based accreditation agency recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. This monumental achievement came after nearly 20 years of effort, marking a historical milestone for the 140-year-old college.

Morris Brown College earning accreditation candidacy is a major achievement demonstrating the institution can meet quality standards and its engagement in continuous improvement. Candidacy indicates that the institution is compliant with the rigorous standards and criteria it has set forth, in addition to being evaluated by an on-site peer team, including the professional judgment of its evaluation team and



the Accreditation Commission, based on the institution providing sound instruction and student services. As of July 1, 2020, the United States Department of Education holds all accrediting agencies to the same standard and it no longer holds a distinction between regional and national accrediting agencies. In 2002, Morris Brown's accreditation was revoked due to debt and financial mismanagement, which barred students from applying for Federal Financial Aid. After obtaining accreditation candidacy, Morris Brown College became eligible to participate in the Federal Financial Aid programs.

Financial aid is any type of college funding that does not come from family, personal savings, or earnings. It can include grants, scholarships, work-study jobs, federal or private loan programs. Financial aid can be used to cover educational expenses such as tuition/fees, room/board, books/supplies, and transportation.

FAFSA can be used to determine eligibility for the following programs:

- Federal Student Aid –Pell Grants, Student loans, and Federal Work-Study.
- · State Financial Aid HOPE Scholarship and Grant programs.
- Institutional Financial Aid Institutional Scholarships offered by a college.
- Private Financial Aid Private Scholarships provided by businesses or other organizations.

"We are elated about the reinstatement of Federal Financial Aid at Morris Brown College- this is history! I want to thank the team for their hard work and for making this possible. Students can now pay to attend Morris Brown College which happens to be one of the most affordable colleges in the entire state of Georgia at \$4250.00 each semester. Founded by formerly enslaved religious leaders at Big Bethel AME Church in 1881, MBC is the first college in Georgia to be owned and operated by African Americans. The iconic Fountain Hall and the current Morris Brown College campus is where Dr. W.E.B. Du Bois wrote "The Souls of Black Folk" in 1903.

Notable alumni include Alberta Williams King, mother of Martin Luther King, Jr., and James Alan McPherson, the first black writer to win a Pulitzer Prize for fiction.

POST-COVID SYNDROME

A disease progression has become known by many names, long haulers, long covid, post-acute COVID 19, or Chronic COVID. These symptoms may endure for weeks or months after the initial infection. It may occur in various infectious states, from mild to severe. It may be associated with the following symptoms, some being non-descript:

Shortness of breath, fatigue, brain fog, cough, headache, heart palpitations, joint and muscle pain, sleep disorder, mood changes, and alteration of menstrual cycles. The overall condition continues to be studied to determine a better management method. It may or may not be associated with medical conditions contributing to the conditions, i.e., smoking, hypertension, diabetes, obesity, and prior chronic lung issues. Multiple theories are in consideration as to why this condition occurs. None is definitive currently.

It may cause damage to organ systems: lungs, heart inflammation, kidney damage, prolongation of disturbance with smell and taste, neurological and mental health issues. The conditions that you report to your primary care provider will govern the type of additional testing necessary to monitor the progression of the disease. The critical component is to speak up about what may not seem like yourself after an infection, whether mild or severe. This is a new disease, and anything which lends itself to a change in your daily routine should be investigated. COVID 19 began in December 2019, there will still be a multitude of unknowns associated, and it will take time and investigation to determine the best method to address the effects.

Are Booster Shots Necessary / Omicron Variant

As the world has been navigating through the pandemic due to COVID-19, the urgency to return to everyday life has been quite unsettling. In August 2021, the US had over 90 million eligible people on record as being unvaccinated. Currently, the number of unvaccinated people in the US has declined to less than 70 million. If attempting to establish herd immunity is challenging, now the FDA has approved to administer Booster Shots to increase "rev" up your immune system to provide more protection as data has revealed that after six (6) months, the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine's potency declines. As schools reopened and many restaurants, stores, and businesses, many states are experiencing an increase in hospitalizations and deaths (more than 1,900 a day in the US). Most of the cases are with children and unvaccinated people. Mix this with the Delta variant representing most new infections reported; we now have the new Omicron variant, so the plausibility in need for a Booster Shot is quite reasonable. The first case of the Omicron variant was discovered in a fully vaccinated patient who traveled to South Africa in NOV. That patient was fully vaccinated but did not have a booster shot. As of December 12th, 43 people have been known to have been infected by the Omicron variant. Currently, the Omicron variant is the predominant cause for newly reported cases. The symptoms have been milder than the Delta variant, but the Omicron variant's transmission is more than the Delta variant. According to new research, the Omicron variant has picked up a snippet of genetic material from another virus - possibly one that causes the common cold - present in the same infected cells. This could explain why the virus transmits more easily. Therefore, similar symptoms may exist. If you develop symptoms of a cold, it is imperative to get a COVID test (PCR preferably) to confirm whether you have the COVID variant vs. the common cold. Pfizer has announced that their booster vaccine has produced enough antibodies to defer the variant. The fight against COVID-19 is not over. We are still learning about the Omicron variant, but we have tools to stop the spread of the virus; the most important among them is to get vaccinated and get a booster dose. In the meantime, the need for a Booster Shot has become more relevant than previously thought. The adverse reactions seen after receiving the first initial two (2) dose vaccination were reported in the data submitted to the FDA from Pfizer regarding the Booster Shot: (1) pain at the injection site, (2) fatigue, and (3) low-grade fever (anything below 100.4° F). The adverse events seen from the Booster were noted to be milder and less severe than reported from the initial first vaccination. Also, new research suggests that applying vigorous exercise and getting a good night's sleep the day before receiving the coronavirus vaccine may bolster the immune system and help hasten the immunization process.
