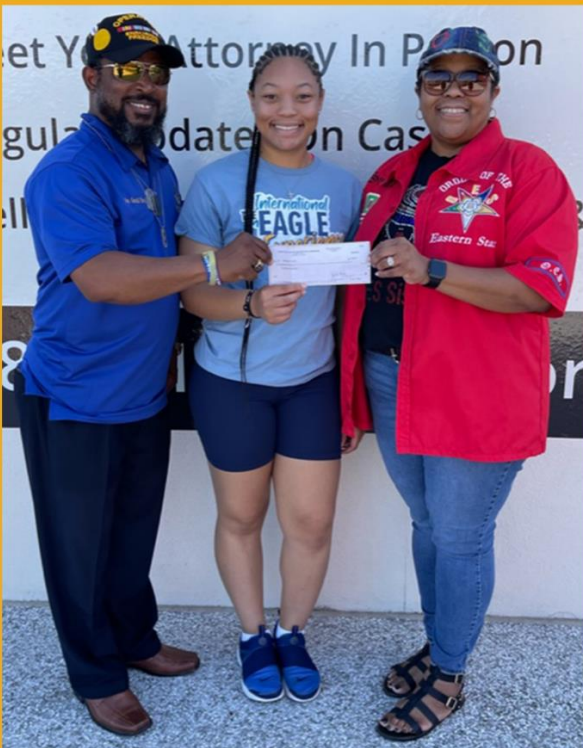
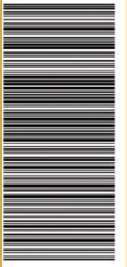

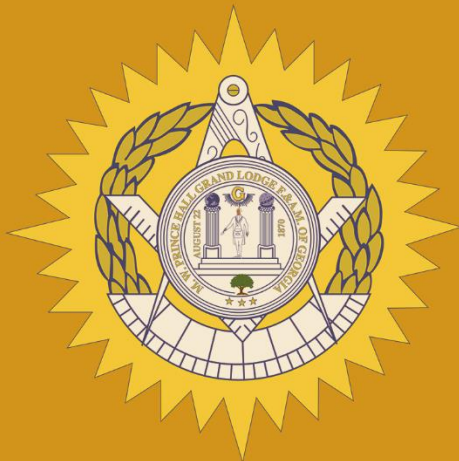

MORRIS BROWN COLLEGE PARTNERS WITH THE MOST WORSHIPFUL PRINCE HALL GRAND LODGE OF GEORGIA-(Article Reprint)

ATLANTA (March 1, 2022) -- Morris Brown College (MBC) is proud to announce it has partnered with the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Georgia to offer its members (Order of the Eastern Stars {OES} included) the opportunity to complete their college education at little to low cost. Morris Brown is also elated to announce its reinstatement to participate in the Federal Financial Aid Program administered by the United States Department of Education. This announcement comes on the heels of receiving accreditation candidacy by the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS), a Virginia-based accreditation agency recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. This monumental achievement came after nearly 20 years of effort, marking a historical milestone for the 141-year-old college.

Prince Hall Freemasonry is the oldest and largest (300,000+ initiated members) predominantly African American fraternity worldwide. Rev. James M. Simms, a District Deputy Grand Master, established Eureka Lodge, No. 1, F. & A. M. in Savannah in 1866. Several other lodges were formed, and in 1870, he organized the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Georgia Free and Accepted Masons. Rev. James M. Simms was elected to serve as its first Grand Master. The Grand Lodge went on to charter more than 500 lodges with over 20,000 members.

President Kevin James, a member of the Prince Hall Masonic Fraternity, said, "I am elated to partner with Grand Master Corey Shackelford, Sr., in this initiative. With the restoration of Morris Brown College as the most affordable HBCU in Atlanta, what better way than to offer this wonderful opportunity? Moreover, the members participate in the historic resurrection story while earning their degrees simultaneously. Through this partnership, all eligible financially active Georgia members will automatically be admitted to Morris Brown College to major in programs such as business, psychology, music, hospitality, general studies, and esports. Moreover, the institution is now a viable option to everyone as we are historically a haven for all hungry souls."

Grand Master Corey Shackelford, Sr. stated, "This partnership with Morris Brown is right on time as we continue to press Freemasonry forward in Georgia. The Prince Hall Masonic Lodge on Auburn Avenue (formerly our Grand East/HQs) recently received a grant that will provide funding for a preservation plan to guide the restoration of the building's character and condition. Moreover, recently the Grand Lodge of Georgia and the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Georgia agreed to grant mutual recognition, further strengthening Georgia Freemasonry. This partnership is meaningful because education is the root of many of these endeavors. These are historic times.

Founded by formerly enslaved religious leaders at Big Bethel AME Church in 1881, MBC is the first college in Georgia to be owned and operated by African Americans. Atlanta's John Marshall Law School and Morris Brown College Partner to Improve Educational Opportunities in Legal Education

(ATLANTA) February 6, 2023 - Atlanta's John Marshall Law School (AJMLS) and Morris Brown College have engaged in a new partnership, facilitating a counseled track to attending law school for eligible applicants.

The partnership, a first of its kind with a historically black college for Atlanta's John Marshall Law School, creates favorable space for Morris Brown students to seek application guidance from the Office of Admissions at Atlanta's John Marshall Law School; and for eligible applicants who meet the standard admissions criteria, to receive priority law school admission. AJMLS is dedicated to providing the opportunity for legal education to both traditional and non-traditional students who show promise of making positive contributions to the profession, legal system, or society. Complimentary to that mission, Morris Brown College prepares their graduates to live meaningful and rewarding lives, thereby enabling them to make socially constructive and culturally relevant contributions to society.

"The partnership between Atlanta's John Marshall Law School and Morris Brown College will open doors for many students from underserved communities that show promise of succeeding in law school," said Jace C. Gatewood, Dean and CEO of AJMLS. "This partnership signals a change in the future of legal education where institutions work together to improve the educational opportunities for all students."

Of the announcement, Morris Brown College President, Dr. Kevin James, said, "We are ecstatic to partner with Atlanta's John Marshall Law School. Morris Brown students now have an official pathway and opportunity to earn a Juris Doctorate degree once they earn their degree from Atlanta's most affordable accredited HBCU."

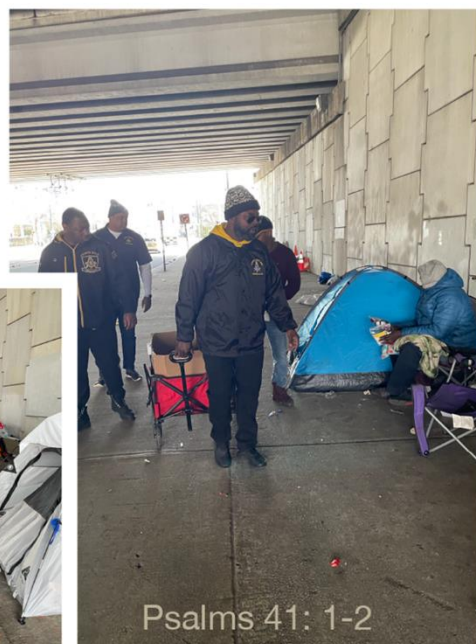

CAMDEN COUNTY CHAPTER No. 191 – 2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

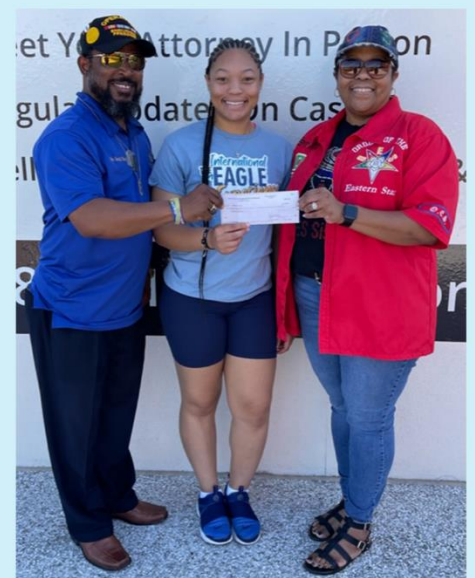

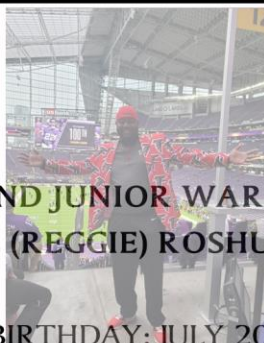
